There is a new Docent Desk Reference Notebook at the Docent Desk. Please read this information carefully about all that goes on in the gallery. I also sent it in an email to all docents and team leaders so that they may study it at home. If you are not a docent or team leader but would like to read this, then please email me and I will send you a copy.

I think you will be amazed on how much of this information you already knew and SHOCKED about how much you have forgotten or did not know.

Gallery Staffing

Answers to questions I have been getting:

Clarification of Timesheets

In the first section of the Timesheet Notebook, you will find ALL of the Displaying Members and the jobs that they do. You will also see 14 General Members who do a job for NBAL. We need everyone who is in this section to mark off the days/hours that they are working. If you are on the Ex-Board or the Team Board and do your job from home on your computer then you need to keep track of your hours and document those hours on your timesheet.

<u>Example:</u> You are on the Team Board, and you work every morning for 3 hours on your computer for 5 days a week. In the notebook, on your timesheet, in the box for January, you should write in "Work from Home, 60 hours".

<u>Example:</u> If you are a Docent then you should just write in the date of the day you are working in the appropriate box of the month.

<u>Example:</u> If you are on the Housekeeping Team then you should write in both days that you come into the gallery to do your job.

In the second section of the Timesheet Notebook, you will find the General Members who do not do a specific job for the gallery. These members may come in to help with a special event or work a day as a Guest Docent because they have entered a Special Show. They need to mark/write in the day or event that they worked on the Timesheet provided in this section.

WHY??

You may be asking yourself "Why are they making us do this?".... We never did this before." In the past when we applied for grants, we just guessed how many volunteer hours our members worked for NBAL. We need to be able to back up that guess with paper documentation if we are ever asked for proof. When I started doing this, I was surprised at how many workers we have and how many hours our members give to NBAL. I believe we have been shortchanging ourselves in the past and should have guessed a higher number.

Being a Sub

When subbing for someone, please put the date and <u>print your name on</u> the sub line in the box of the month you are working for them on <u>their timesheet</u>. If you traded with them then they should put their name on your timesheet. Please mark if you are subbing in an emergency situation, have traded your day, or are being paid to work this day where indicated under your name. If you agree to sub for someone for the fee, you still need to work your regular time.

Making Up a Missed Day

If you have missed a workday due to bad weather, or an emergency that you were not able to get a sub for, then you need to make up your day. Find the <u>Reassignment Schedule</u> found over the Docent Desk in the workroom. This will have the dates that NBAL needs workers as Docents or as staff for Special Events. Please sign this form where you want to work. If you are filling a docent slot, then also mark the <u>Docent Workday Calendar</u> on the day you will fill in. This is so you will be called with a reminder about working.

Question about calling artist about the pricing of their artwork

I know our policy says...no discounts or deals on selling art in our gallery... but I've been there when people asked about it and the artist was called. I think some of us docents are unclear about this. Can you clarify this?

Yes, our policy is no discounts or deals on selling the art in the gallery. The reason is that it is cruel to call an artist and ask them to take less for the work they have done. Think about this from the artist's viewpoint.... and I know because I have been called and asked to come down on my prices before.

An artist works long and sometimes difficult hours to create something that they are passionate about. They NEVER get paid for the time they have invested into a piece of art. I have worked

as a jeweler in the past, for three different jewelry stores/manufacturers, and the only time I have gotten a fair amount for my work hours was when they were paying me an hourly wage. As an independent artist painting or working in ceramics, I started out documenting every time I sat down to work and was shocked at the amount of time I took with each piece. I tried charging \$10 an hour and had to face the fact that no one would buy my art for that amount... Ouch! Then you try adding up the cost of the materials that you have used and doubling it or tripling it and that is way too low for the backbreaking hours you have put in. SO.... you try to find a happy medium between these two prices and that is what you put on your price tag.

Imagine being the artist who gets a phone call from the gallery and is excited thinking "Someone liked my art enough to buy it and the gallery is calling me to tell me that I have sold something.... Yeah!", but instead they are asked to take less for their hard work. Let me tell you it is a creative soul crushing question and very cruel. That is why the policy is not to call.

Maybe I am wrong about how our artists feel???? If an artist wants to be called about possible discounts on their artwork, then they can write a message at the top of their inventory sheet saying something like this "Please feel free to call me to discuss my prices."

Gallery Appearance

Changes to Gallery Rules.... You may want to print these out or make changes in the yearbook for yourself. I have highlighted the changes.

Change to Gallery Rules section 7, Labeling and Documentation of Artwork for Display, page 20/21.

7. DISPLAY CRITERIA FOR MAIN GALLERY AND SPECIAL SHOWS Labeling and Documentation of Artwork for Display

g. Photographs that have been altered or manipulated by using a computer should be labeled for sale and entered into shows as Photo/Digital Art. Photographs that have been printed on a canvas or a substrate and then altered on top of with any media should be labeled as Enhanced Photography and entered as Photo/Digital Art in all competitions or while on display in the main gallery.

Change to Gallery Rules section 7, Display Requirements, page 22 - 23 of the Yearbook.

7. DISPLAY CRITERIA FOR MAIN GALLERY AND SPECIAL SHOWS

Display Requirements

All artwork offered for display must be "gallery ready". This may differ depending on the media. Please see below for guidelines.

h. Artists who work in jewelry are asked to monitor their cases and keep them clean and up to date. No signage, photos or paperwork should be in the case. The Jeweler may place a name plaque or card no larger than three inches by five inches in their case with a title, description of work or instructions to view their Artist Inventory Sheet for a listing of materials. The 1st VP will determine when jewelry cases do not meet NBAL expectations. The Board is the final appellate authority. Jewelers must provide their own display furniture. A jewelry case cannot be empty.

Change to Gallery Rules section 8, Gift Gallery, page 24 of the Yearbook.

8. Gift Gallery

Small works for the Gift Gallery must be labeled GG on the art tag and noted in GG column on an NBAL Artist Inventory Log Sheet. Total inches (height plus width) will count towards the Displaying Members allotted 150-inch display area.

The Gift Gallery has three display areas; you may place 5 items priced under \$100 in each area:

- (1) Wall/Hanging Area Hanging pieces that are no more than 15 inches in any measurement, including the frame.
- (2) Tabletop/Shelves Small tabletop pieces such as small boxes, sculptures, or paintings no larger than 10 inches in any measurement, including frames or easels.
- (3) Card Rack/Baskets Packs of cards and/or matted artwork (as per gallery rules).
